

Fujinoyama Roller Coaster: A Thrilling Ride in the Heart of Japan



Fujinoyama Roller Coaster, located in the scenic heights of Fujiyoshida, Yamanashi, Japan, stands as a testament to the adrenaline-pumping world of amusement parks. For a year, it held the record as the fastest roller coaster globally until Tower of Terror at Dreamworld in Queensland, Australia, surpassed it in 1997. Despite its speed accolades, Fujinoyama did not secure any records for coaster speed, with the Steel Phantom at Kennywood Group holding the world speed record.

Name and Origin:

Named after the iconic Mount Fuji, which stands proudly west of Tokyo, Fujinoyama derives its name from "Fuji," meaning king, and "yama," meaning mountain. Although Mount Fuji is rarely referred to as "Fujinoyama" in Japanese culture, the coaster's name is a playful nod to potential misunderstandings or mistranslations by foreigners. Similar

to many Japanese roller coasters, the maximum age for riders is 54 years, with a separate entrance fee of 1,000 yen, in addition to the standard height restrictions.

Design and Track:

Fujinoyama follows the typical layout of roller coasters with a round-trip journey, featuring various elements common in coaster designs. It includes a substantial initial drop, a "headchopper" element, and a series of small hills near the end of the ride.

Reception:

The coaster garnered significant attention upon its construction, breaking records and creating a buzz in the amusement park world. While some locals positively rated the ride, earning it a 5-star review from coaster enthusiast Stephen Urbanowicz, Fujinoyama did not make it to the list of the top 50 steel coasters in Amusement Today's 2009 Golden Ticket Awards.
